Time to step out front and take charge ...

The duties and time requirements for various officer positions are listed on the website – click on the officer title to get a description of the office and other information. You can also talk to any of the officers about the requirements of their office.

Being an officer is a great way to get to know all the club members and a good way to put something back into the club. All these great activities don't *just happen*. They are the result of dedicated effort from the club officers, committee chairs and trip leaders and activity sponsors. We give our special thanks to those who generously donate their time and skills to these positions.

We will have ballots at the meeting. You must be present to vote.

Currently, we have the following candidates:

President: Linda Elonen-Wright

The club president must be a full-time NASA Civil Service employee, will preside at all meetings of the club and the Executive Board. The President shall, in

general, act as the chief executive of the Board. The President shall appoint chairmen of all committees except the Nominating Committee and shall be a standing member of all committees and shall perform all duties incident on the office of President. The President shall promote publication and review of the Guidebook on an annual basis. It shall be the responsibility of the president of the club to see that the statement of continued existence is properly filed with the Office of the Secretary of State of Ohio every five years.

The incumbent currently spends about ten hours each month attending to the affairs of the office.

Specific Duties include:

- Presiding over all Club Meetings and Board Meetings
- Appoints committee chairs
- Writes a monthly newsletter column
- Authorized to sign club checks

Alpine VP: Al Linne

The Alpine Vice President shall perform all the duties of the President in their absence and assume such duties as delegated him/her by the President. The Alpine Vice President shall be responsible for overseeing all activities associated with the club's downhill ski program. The Alpine Vice President shall, in coordination with the Nordic Vice President, issue the guidebook to each activity coordinator and shall encourage compliance therewith. Finally, he/she shall perform all duties incident to the office.

Specific duties include:

- Recruit/select trip coordinators
- Hold annual trip planning meeting (destinations & calendar)
- Secure bus transportation for local trips
- Advise trip coordinators

Nordic VP: No candidate yet

The Nordic Vice President will assist the Alpine Vice President in performing the duties of the President in

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his/her absence and assume such duties as delegated him/her by the President. The Nordic Vice President will be responsible for overseeing all the activities associated with the club's cross-country ski program. The Nordic Vice President shall, in coordination with the alpine Vice President, issue the guide book to each activity coordinator and shall encourage compliance therewith. Finally, he/she shall perform all duties incident to the office.

Specific duties include:

- Coordinates planning of nordic outings
- Recruits and advises trip coordinators

Activity VP: Tony Shook

The Activities VP is responsible for overseeing all the activities other than snow sports. These include biking, inline skating, canoeing parties and other recreational activities.

Recorder: Kristen Newcombe

The Recorder shall keep accurate and complete minutes of all meetings and report them to the club at the appropriate time. The recorder shall notify the members of the board of all board meetings. Finally, the recorder shall perform all other duties incident on the office.

Specific duties include:

- Records minutes of the general membership meetings
- Records minutes of monthly board meetings
- Distributes minutes to board
- Maintains file of past meeting minutes
 The incumbent spends 2-3 hours per month on these duties.

Treasurer: Colin Bidwell

The Treasurer shall handle the general funds of the club, shall keep an up-to-date record of all club finances, available to the Executive Board on 24-hour notice. The Treasurer will make a monthly report at all club meetings on receipts, disbursements and account balances. The Treasurer will keep an up-to-date list of all active members and perform all other duties incident on the office. (Both

the Treasurer and the President will be authorized to sign checks.) The fiscal year for the Lewis Ski Club, Inc. is defined to be May 1st through April 30th.

Specific duties:

- Manages the club's bank account
- Writes checks as needed by activity coordinators
- Prepares a monthly financial summary
- Prepares annual budget
- Reviews final activity financial reports

Publicity Director: No candidate yet

The Publicity Director shall have charge of all correspondence and publicity, oversee distribution of the club newsletter, notify all members of all club meetings and perform all other duties incident on the office.

Specific duties include:

- Assemble, edit, and distribute monthly newsletter
- Prepare and submit Sitzmark articles
- Prepare and submit annual CMSC Directory input

Candidate should expect to spend 8 hours per month on the newsletter, 1 hour each for 5 Sitzmark articles, ½ hour for annual CMSC Directory submittal.

Trustee: Malcolm Woods

This is one of three positions. One trustee is elected each year – an individual trustee has a three-year term. The trustees provide guidance and oversight for the activities of the club. The Trustees are the guardians of the club constitution and shall be responsible to the members to ensure that all the articles and sections of the constitution are followed.

Specific duties include:

- Perform an annual audit of the club treasury.
- Conduct an annual review of the activity guide.
- Provide semi-annual written reports to the members.
- Provide verbal reports at the club meetings.

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Fam Trip - Steamboat Springs Colorado



In the first week of February, seven NASA ski club representatives (from various centers) arrived in a true western town. We were determined to investigate the potential of this Colorado destination named Steamboat or as it is simply known around the globe, Ski Town USA®. Mixed in with Stetson hats and cowboy boots we found a sophisticated world-class resort. This western town had an abundance of amenities. We took note of several spas, various styles of resort lodging, restaurants that catered to all tastes (western to sushi), art galleries, and shops galore. The activities you can do range to just about anything.

There is a defensive driving school on ice, horseback riding on Mt. Werner, sleigh or sled rides, an ice skate rink, snowmobile tours and a favorite of minesoaking sore muscles at Strawberry Park hot springs. There is definitely more to Steamboat than the snow and world class skiing. Did I mention the snow, the powder?

Steamboat Springs has 308" as I sit here in the last week of March, writing this article. It makes me wonder why I am not working on my raccoon tan and skiing down Shadows run with that legendary Champagne Powder® snow up to the brim of my helmet. It really is that great! Steamboat averages over 30 feet of snowfall every season and it's the dry fluffy type (meteorologists measure it having 70% less moisture than average snow).

The week of our FAM trip started out sunny with nicely groomed corduroy runs. It wasn't powder...yet. These conditions worked out great, since most of the NASA representatives had already skied for a week at Winter Park and had tired legs. It also helped keep to the task of seeing as many lodgings as possible. We met our goal and reviewed over twenty places, during two days.


Steamboat has everything from decent to deluxe amenities. Granted, one was horrible and removed immediately from any possible list. All the places had multiple ways to split room numbers depending on group size. The lodging consisted of condos, with some hotel

type variations. The hotel types were the most basic in style. The most deluxe (and worst) accommodation is found under the ski-in ski out. The list prices, variations, & recommendations are in the works.

For the FAM group, we stayed and relaxed at "The Ranch," a great condo set-up with a view of the mountain. It was serviced by a handy shuttle that took you to the gondola square (the ski shop provided ski storage) or dropped you to anywhere in town. The ease of getting around via the shuttle proved that anyplace with such a service would be a great choice to stay. And if you happened to stay out late, the taxi service wasn't pricey!

On the second day, the mountain resort matched us with two mountain hosts for a guided ski tour of Steamboat ski area. These guides are wonderful and available to anyone daily for free tours. In fact, one of our guides may be familiar to you, for he's a retired NASA Lewis Center Director turned ski/golf extraordinaire.

During our tour we learned that we were actually skiing six peaks of world class skiing, located seven thousand feet up in the Colorado Rockies. The mountain has a vertical rise of 3,668 feet that makes it the second



highest in the State of Colorado. The trail system consists of 142 named trails that make up over 65 miles of Champagne Powder® skiing, nearly 3,000 skiable acres with the longest run over 3 miles. The most impressive fact was that SKI Magazine continues to set Steamboat apart by rating the family programs the best in the west!

You can find groomed cruisers, bumps, steeps, open meadows, bowls, legendary tree skiing, gladed areas like Storm Peak, and North America's longest superpipe (Maverick) a freeriders dream. The terrain park features the superpipe, hips, rails, tables, mailboxes, and Mini-Mav (perfect for beginners). This mountain range offers all classes of skiing with 13% beginner trails, 56% intermediate and hold on to your cowboy hat 31% Wow!

There is also Nordic skiing available in the area for those that burn for X-C.

After day number three, only three of us braved staying for the winter storm that hit the rest of the week. Champagne Powder snow everywhere, plus the fun of seeing the 90th Winter Carnival that hosts events like horses pulling kids on skis down the main street of town, as well as, pioneers snowshoeing around with black powder guns. On the hill the choices were wonderful. Shred freshies, dip into the trees, or go watch the Sprint US Freestyle Grand National World Cup tearing up the moguls with world class jumps being tamed. This all took

place as we skied down a parallel runs. In truth, my favorite spot to watch the action is located at the slope side ski-aspre, pub.

Everywhere we visited, I felt, a shared friendliness and hospitality you'd only find in a small-town. It is a wonderful place. Now for those of you who want a truly unique experience I have a breathtaking ski adventure that I whole-heartedly recommend trying. Take your visit one step further and sign up for at least one day of perfect skiing, shredding, with Steamboat Powdercat at Blue Skywest's operation.

My experience was so incredible. After my first trip of dreamy powder, no lift lines, and making new ski buddies on the snowcat I had to go back. The very next day I arranged to go again. And I enjoyed it so much; I talked another guest into signing up. You'll understand when you experience the face shots and dry powder. To see your skis float to the surface is serenity. It's the perfect outing. Steamboat Powdercats have a permitted terrain that receives snowfall depths in the 500-inch range every year. Go ahead and plan it, and tell yourself it's in case the mountain has been skied out. My NASA companions who skied the lifts while I was out on the snowcat found their runs to be powdered out by afternoon (except in the trees).

Whereas I it was still deep all day...everywhere. The Steamboat Powdercats say, "You can expect to ski in deep powder (from late December to the end of March)."

The runs vary in length from 600 to 1,600 vertical feet and in steepness between 20 and 45 degrees. I had 15 runs, plus 14 the next time (road on the snowcat for 2). Skiing is done on open snowfields and in world famous trees. Those trees will give you bragging rites, since the beautiful pines collect the snow and the aspen trees force you to react. There are three levels of ability. They roughly fit Intermediate, Advanced and Wow skiers. I found that there was plenty of pitch and room to turn on

the level II. Check out there website for figuring out the best fit for you. The views and snow I saw fit a description I read, that said, "An aesthetic experience via athleticism."

Level I and II enjoys a gourmet lunch served in a mid-mountain cabin. But on Level III lunch is on the ride up. Did I mention the Steamboat hospitality shines everywhere you go, and that includes the Steamboat Powdercat operators and guides? I think those guides are the friendliest, most devoted staff around, just like their counterparts at the Steamboat Resort. It's activities like these that Steamboat offers that sets it apart from other ski resorts.

So, whether you stop at one of the local pubs, ride the gondola up for a moonlit

dinner, or take a stroll down the historical ranching town you'll experience why it is called Ski Town USA®. There is nothing like it, and I can honestly say that you will have a fantastic experience. And I hope that our ski club will visit with the other centers next year. I know I'll be back to visit this resort town to investigate further the pioneer spirit, freshies-- Champagne Powder® and welcome warmth. Did I mention the snow and powder?

The Metro Cup!!!!

The golf outing will have CMSC clubs competing in five divisions for The Metro Cup, a rotating trophy that will be emblazoned with the winning team's name. The divisions are: Men's Medal Play, Women's Medal Play, Two Person Coed Scramble Team, Two Person Best Ball Team, Four Person Scramble Team. The best ball team and the four-person scramble team may be all male, all female, or any combination. Points will be awarded in each division, first through last place. The club that accumulates the most points wins the Metro Cup.
