



Ski Denton Trip Report



This year, Lewis Ski Club's only new ski destination was to Ski Denton, in north central Pennsylvania. This one-day bus trip took 26 adventuresome skiers looking for some new hills to conquer. The weather for this late January trip certainly

cooperated for us -- temperatures in the mid 20's, no wind and periods of sunshine.

Ski Denton is slightly smaller in size than our other typical one-day destinations, but it does have an equivalent vertical height. Still, the ski resort had plenty of room, because when our bus arrived at Ski Denton, there were only 10 other skiers on the slopes! That meant no lift lines, wide open trails, plenty of room in the lodge and still some fresh snow still left over from a storm two days earlier. The Ski Denton staff was also very friendly and we were all off the bus and skiing in less than 15 minutes.

Ski Denton has a variety of trails from beginners

to one trail that is advertised as the steepest trail in the east. Just picture Holiday Valley's "*The Wall*", but about 2-1/2 times longer and void of any ice patches. After a couple runs down that trail, your thighs feel like mush. By the end of the day, everybody was worn out, but very satisfied with the terrain and snow conditions. Our one Nordic skier received a free lift ride to the top of the hill and then she spent all day skiing the Nordic trails along the wooded ridges. Our "senior" skiers had a great deal, with \$10 lift ticket for skiers in their late 60's and free skiing for 70+ year olds.

After skiing, we drove to the town of Olean, NY, for our dinner stop. Olean, NY, offered a choice of over a dozen restaurants -- all within walking distance of the bus. After dinner, we all jumped back on the bus and we arrived back at NASA by 11:15pm. I wanted to thank all the club members who signed up and made this trip happen, it was a shame that we still had lots of room on the bus. Ski Denton had everything that you needed, great snow conditions, a variety of trails and terrain and

Fam Trip Report - Quebec City

Myself and about two-dozen other ski club representatives from the eastern US and Canada, spent three days visiting Quebec City and skiing the nearby ski areas. The Quebec Tourism Office organized this "fam" trip, which we spent two nights in downtown Quebec and two nights at Mont Sainte-Anne Ski Resort. Quebec City is located in Canada, on the St. Lawrence River, about 750 miles from Cleveland.

Quebec City has 3 ski resorts that are close to town:

<u>Stoneham</u>, about 20 minutes from downtown, has four mountain peaks, 1380 foot vertical, 32 trails and 326 acres. The ski area is mostly a good cruiser hill, with a very good terrain park and two express lifts. About 8 years ago, Stoneham held a World cup men slalom event which was won by Alberto Tomba.

Mont Sainte-Anne, about 30 minutes from downtown, is a "resort style" ski area, 2050 foot vertical, 56 trails and 425 acres. This ski area is more challenging, with more variety of terrain, with one gondola and 2 express lifts. Also, Mont Sainte-Anne has a lot of non-skiing activities and lodging. I saw a local outdoor broomball game and people dog sledding.

Le Massif. about 45 minutes from downtown, has its slopes are adjacent to the St. Lawrence River, 2645 foot vertical, 38 trails and 250 acres. The ski area is call a "Mountain by the Sea", and it had the most challenging terrain, with 2 express lifts. Le Massif had breathtaking views of the St. Lawrence River and the most natural snowfall in eastern Canada. Also, Le Massif is the home of the Canadian downhill/GS training center with a dedicated race course.

This year, I have skied in Utah, France, Italy and twice in New York, but could you believe that my first powder day of the year would be in Quebec! We had a twelve inch snowfall on our second day of skiing and I was finding untracked powder all day long. The other two ski days had plenty of sunshine and mild temperatures (highs in the 20's). Quebec City is removed from the Great Lakes, so they usually don't have the overcast skies like in Cleveland. Most of their storms are the Nor'easters off the Atlantic and then they have clear skies the other days. Both Mont Sainte-Anne and Le Massif usually stay open for skiing till May, so their snow really lasts. All said and done, I was quite pleased with their ski areas.

But a ski trip to Quebec is much more than just skiing. What's really unique about Quebec City is that

you can stay downtown and experience the most European city in North America and still go skiing. Quebec City is an old city and has a lot of history. It was established as the first permanent settlement in Canada, in 1609 and is the Capital of the Province of Quebec. It has spent time under French and British control, before Canada was established 150 years ago. The downtown section is the only "walled" city in Canada or the US. The 6.2 mile castle-like fortress protecting the old city quarter was built on a bluff above the St. Lawrence River. The old city quarter is full of pedestrian friendly streets with unique shops, street artisans and cafes that are very similar to European cities. The Château Frontenac hotel and about 10 different cultural museums are all located in the old quarter. The architecture alone merits a visit to Quebec.

But the most memorable part of my trip was definitely the dining and cuisine. The Quebec dining establishments surely match their French heritage. Every meal was fresh and delicious from breakfast through dinner. The food and wine was all exceptional and always served in the "French style" relaxed atmosphere. In fact, at Le Massif's base lodge, their food was not cafeteria fare, but was fresh pasta, vegetables, seafood, etc. and no fast food or French fries.

We also saw many other sites around Quebec. We stopped by the Quebec Ice Hotel one evening, which had 15 sleeping rooms. The entire building and its ice sculptures were just amazing. One afternoon, we stopped at a huge snow tubing park, which also had whitewater raft slides and a go-carting on ice track. The three week long Quebec Carnival had just started when we arrived, with lots of outdoor activities and games. The following weekend was their famous ice canoe race on the 90% frozen St. Lawrence River.

Visiting Quebec anytime in the year is worth a trip, but with the good close by skiing, you'll have a great winter vacation. I certainly will go back to Quebec and hopefully our ski club will also visit Quebec too.

A quick note -- One member of our group Nordicskied all three areas and he said he had a great time and all my references about "skiing" these mountains, I really meant "snowboarding."
