NASA Ski Team Crushes Competition at Combined!

That's right folks, fresh off the slopes of Bristol Mountain, the NASA Ski Team recorded it's best team result ever in CMSC's Combined Championships. There was no shortage of individual highlights either, as every team member turned in outstanding performances. Fielding a small but powerful team, with six competitors in four classes, skiing in three races (that's five runs!) over two days, we brought home the hardware and finished a resounding 3rd overall in Division 2, our best team finish ever!

That's the team result, now let's recap the individual finishes. Therese Telzrow dominated her class, CCVW, winning the Super G, GS, and Slalom, and of course, bringing home a Combined trophy as well. She even earned her first strike in the slalom on Sunday! Bruce wasted no time serving notice in BVM he was there to race, winning the Super G and GS on Saturday. He followed up with a second place on Sunday in the slalom, taking Combined as well. He also received a strike in each race on Saturday, and was bumped to BBVM! Lisa Lambert made her case for racer of the year in BW, with a win in the Super G, 2nd in the GS, and a 4th in the slalom. Combined is determined by total time for five runs, and Lisa brought home the big trophy as well! For those of you keeping track at home, that's three Combined Champions out of six racers. What a team!

We never would have made it to third in Division 2 without a strong supporting cast, and the rest of the team did not disappoint. Cheryl Alden got her BW mojo working on the big hill this year, finishing 3rd in the Super G, winning the GS, and taking 3rd in Slalom. Looks like NASA is ready to dominate B Women, until Lisa and Cheryl earn their strikes too, it's just a matter of time! Elise Frankenfiled brought home valuable team points race after race, finishing a consistent 4th in each event, racing with Therese in CCVW. I guess NASA is a force in that class as well! Race Chair Mark, skiing his first Combined in BBM, contributed a 6th in the Super G, and finished 5th in both GS and slalom. Mark, and his racing pride, even survived taking out the fencing by crashing in the finish corral in the Super G!

That's it for Combined, but let's cover the results from Boston Mills and Swain, just to be thorough in February. Lisa Lambert finished 2nd in both GS and Slalom at Swain. Quite the way to represent the team, as she was the only racer on the hill for us that weekend. We were more numerous at Boston Mills, with six racers on the hill. Cheryl led the way with a win in BW, followed by Lisa in 5th. Bruce added a 5th in BVM, while Elise and Don Ginley chalked up 6th and 2nd on CCVW and CCVM, respectively. Finally, in C Snowboard, Bruce brought home a win, while Mark added a third place finish.

That's it for now. We'll add a final update after the last races of the year, coming up at Kissing Bridge and Swain. Congratulations to all our racers on a great season, so far! (his brother follows 50 ft behind with a fire extinguisher--just in case he's needed). 200 or so little kids (6 and up) either snake down the same darkened slope with flares in both hands--(who puts fire in the hands of a 6 year old)-- or do trick jumps in the dark with flares! Then a ski patrol guy skis down one of the long jumps hauling a flaming sled and jumps through a flaming hoop to boot! This town takes extreme way out there! Saturday and Sunday snow was spread down main street and galloping horses, hauling 6 to 14 yr old slalom skiers, boarders or cross country kids, race to the finish line for prizes. Where but out west would Moms and Dads let their kids get so close to horse's hooves! Then there was a dogsled race for the wee ones---on sled or inner tubes, kiddies were pulled by the likes of Great Danes to Heinz dogs---one funny race!....Then Dads were put in the harnesses and had to pull the same wee ones on all fours to the same finish

line. Sunday morning they had what I called a Fat Friday Steamboat Parade--the school band on cross country skis, huge sleds with bearskin rugs hauling kids in inner tubes tossing candy to the crowds, the Burmese mountain dog club with at least a dz. of those beautiful dogs, a crazy bunch of older ladies, decked out in moth eaten furs and leopard skin leotards, wild feather and tinseled hats, all being hauled around by a snow groomer as they all sang "Baby light my fire"! and lots more! A Day and Night at Snow Trails

Nearby Alpine Ski Area, Lodging, and Restaurant are worth the trip...

We've all heard the disparaging remarks about the poor skiing in Ohio. The truth is, though, if you really enjoy skiing or snowboarding and you don't want to travel too far, at least one Ohio ski area can be a great escape.

For many years, I have thought about driving south to Snow Trails near Mansfield, but simply hadn't taken the time to do so. On a recent weekend, my wife and I decided to explore the area. We made the roughly 90 minute drive from Cleveland Heights in the morning, skied all afternoon, stayed overnight, and drove back the next day.

Snow Trails is a nice ski area. It has thirteen trails, the longest being about 2000 feet in length with about 300 feet of vertical. The beginner area has gentle, even slopes that were not crowded. The intermediate runs are long enough to get in more than a few turns and there are a couple more challenging runs and terrain parks. The snow coverage and conditions were quite good, even though they had had a lot of rain and warm temperatures the previous week. The snow making and grooming were above average. The lifts were adequate and there was no waiting in lift lines, even though it was a holiday weekend. For more information, go to: www.snowtrails.com.

We stayed the night at Spruce Hill Inn and Cottages, located on the slopes adjacent to Snow Trails. We were very much impressed by these new cottages. Our unit was part of a quaint, double cottage. It had a large bedroom-living room area with a nook near the entrance that included a sink, small refrigerator, and microwave oven. There was also a large, full bathroom that included a jacuzzi. The unit was cozy, clean, and very well kept. We found the hostess, Elizabeth, to be very accommodating, with a ready, pleasant smile. A nice touch was a large selection of DVD movies that could be borrowed from the main lodge free of charge. For \$85 per night, it is hard to beat. I haven't stayed in anything nicer in my trips to Colorado or Utah! More information can be found at: www.sprucehillinn.com.

For dinner that evening, we drove a short distance to Malabar Farm Restaurant, about eight miles from Snow Trails. This French restaurant, located in a restored stagecoach inn, has some of the best French cooking around. I had roast duck with a large helping of french fries. Both were excellent. My wife had some of the best veggie lasagna she'd (or I'd) ever tasted. For dessert, my cherry crème brulee was as good as any I've had in France! ACTIVITIES VICE-PRESIDENT: The Activities V.P. is responsible for overseeing all the activities other than those associated with the club's on-snow program including, but not limited to, biking, inline skating, canoeing, white water rafting, parties, and other such recreational activities, issues the Activity Guide, in conjunction with the Alpine V.P. and Nordic V.P., to each Activity Coordinator, and assists the Alpine V.P. and Nordic V.P. in performing the duties of the president.

RECORDER: The Recorder shall keep accurate and complete minutes of all meetings and report them to the Club members. He/she shall notify the members of the Board of all Board meetings.

PUBLICITY DIRECTOR: The Publicity Director shall have charge of all club publicity, oversee distribution of the club newsletter, notify all members of all club meetings and perform all other duties incident to the office.

TREASURER: The Treasurer shall handle the general funds of the Club, keep an up-to-date record of all Club finances, and report receipts, disbursements, and account balances at the monthly membership meeting.
