Easy to Join and Use "Zoom" Meetings

If you haven't experienced "Zoom" virtual meetings, don't be intimidated by the technology – it's easier than you might think. Zoom is a video conferencing software that the Club has purchased a license for which allows participants to see and talk to each other in real time, right from their internet device. If your PC, Mac, i-Pad, or smart phone has a built-in camera and speakers (and almost all of them do) and you receive e-mail on it, you have everything you need to participate. Each Zoom meeting has a host, who sends an e-mail, including a hyperlink, directly to the people invited to the meeting.



ZOOM Video SMART Meetings

To join the meeting, you click on the hyperlink in the e-mail and follow its simple instructions. First-time users may be instructed to download the software (which takes just a minute or two), so should start the process several minutes before the scheduled meeting.

Alpine Update

While much of the details need to be finalized over the next few months, the major trips being considered for 2021 are a late-January/early-February trip to Breckenridge, Colorado and a March outing to the Banff/Lake Louise area in Canada. Leaders have been selected for those trips, who are in the process of working up details and proposals for the approval of the Club Executive Board.

Trip Leadership

With each trip I lead, I learn something. I learn from past trip leaders who offer wisdom. I learn from our members what their expectations are. I listen. I appreciate their feedback, those members who join me as we adventure west. They understand what it takes to organize and run a successful trip. It takes planning and research. It involves budgeting, including all the additional expenses beyond the contract with the winter sports travel agency. Gratuities, parties, group dinners, and PayPal fees all must be considered before the final price for a trip is determined. The Executive Board reviews the proposed trip price with amenities and perks and decides whether it will be a club sponsored trip. The price is the split into various payments allowing for certain payments to be omitted if participant has a another lesson learned. pass. Expect the unexpected, plan for a cushion. Sometimes the final trip report comes in at a breakeven but more often than not, there is a surplus. This surplus is deposited into the general fund and assists the club with deposits for future trips or other expenditures that the membership would approve. In the event that a particular portion of the planned events did not occur, it is possible that a refund could be made to the participants. They chose the group travel because we handle the logistics, the costs are allinclusive, and we have a really good time skiing and riding together.

Member COVID-19 Pandemic and Shutdown Experiences

(As we go through this unprecedented time, we encourage any member to share their experiences in dealing with the COVID-19 pandemic and resulting restrictions. We hope these stories will help keep us optimistic and connected at least in spirit.)



My company (manufacturing) has stayed open. We have most office staff working from home and added a dedicated weekend shift to move machinists safely apart. I do daily disinfection of the common areas of the plant. We had a team of 3 who

made 300 masks for the company and have distributed them, 1 each for now. Visitors and delivery people were temperature-checked at first, and now we all are as we come in as well as any visitors. We did send a driver back to his tractor once because he was not well (not COVID-19 in the end). So far so good, as no cases have impacted us. We do have people who have been "sent home/told to stay home" because of illness or possible exposure to someone who was ill. We also did a facility-wide disinfection over Easter weekend straight up as preventative. Keeping morale up is pretty hard, but our Human Resources organization is doing little things - like sandwiches today - and we get treats at least once a week, like cake-pops this Monday.
