It may only be spring, but planning for the 2026 ski season is already in full swing. Our Big Sky trip is selling well with only **8** spots remaining, and Epic and Ikon season passes are on sale. Epic Pass prices have already increased as of May 27th and the CMSC Ski Travel show was held on May 10th.

With Big Sky filling up nicely, a second weeklong trip is being considered for earlier in the 2026 ski season. We should have a decision about that trip ready for the July newsletter and our August Ski Club picnic.

Presque Isle Bike Ride and Beach Picnic



We've scouted out a great spot to meet for our adventure!

Join us at Beach No. 8 Pettinato at 10:30am on Saturday, June 7th. Beach 8 offers easy access to the trail; modern restrooms and a concession stand. To top it off they have large solar panels that act as carports to keep our cars cool on a sunny day!





Presque Isle State Park offers beautiful views of Lake Erie and 13 <u>flat</u> miles of trail that loop around the peninsula. Along the way, we'll stop to check out the various beaches and attractions, such as the lighthouse and Perry's monument. We will end our ride back at Beach 8 to enjoy a picnic lunch (bring your own) on the beach.



As I write this, Erie, PA is currently forecasted to be 69 and partly sunny on June 7th (the peninsula might be cooler); however, we won't drive two hours without reasonable assurance of a nice day. Our alternate date is Saturday, June 14th. Watch your email and our website, in case we need to pivot.

What to bring: Bike, helmet, water, cooler, lunch, snacks, drinks, beach chair, kite, flip flops, etc.

Directions: N. Peninsula Drive is the main road that loops around the peninsula. Most of the loop is one way in a counterclockwise direction. Follow Peninsula Drive past the Waterworks area. Next, cross W. Fischer Drive (you'll see signs for the Marina). As soon as you cross W. Fischer, get in the left turning lane and take the cross-over, following the signs for beach 8. Boom, you're there! If you miss the cross over, there are a few more on the narrow



neck of the peninsula, but if you miss them, you'll be stuck taking the loop around the Northeast end of the peninsula and circling back.

Later, on your way off the peninsula, consider stopping at the state-of-the-art Tom Ridge Environmental center. Kim and I



scoped it out – it's amazing and includes a great gift shop. See you next Saturday!

Mountain Travel Symposium 2025

Mountain Travel Symposium (MTS) is the largest annual conference for mountain travel professionals in the world. There are more than 800 representatives from 35+ countries who come to build their business and establish relationships by creating a strong mountain adventure. Every year, the MTS is hosted by a different resort. This year MTS was at Snowmass, CO. It was an opportunity for a trip leader from each club to go and meet other trip leaders and vendors to connect and build relationships. Think of it as an extended familiarization trip.



You have 2 options if selected for an invite:

Standard option: Travel on Wednesday, ski on Thursday, attend the conference on Friday, ski Saturday then travel home Sunday.

Extended option: Travel on Monday, ski Tuesday - Thursday, attend the conference on Friday, ski Saturday then travel home on Sunday.

I selected the extended option: Monday, April 7 through Sunday April 13.

Snowmass has four mountains to choose from: Aspen, Aspen Highland, Buttermilk and Snowmass. My personal favorite is SNOWMASS.



On Monday we were treated to a welcome reception hosted by Snowbird and Copper Mountain. It included a casual night of mingling with other trip leaders and host reps. We swapped stories and got jazzed for the next day.



On Tuesday we skied at Aspen and were treated to a professional instructor in groups of 4 -8 participants, depending on your level of skiing. My group had 3 snowboarders and 2 snowboarding instructors. We visited local ski shrines hidden in the mountain, hiked to scenic routes, and took some great pictures as part of a tour of the Aspen Mountain layout. In the evening, we had après at Gravity Haus with cocktails, appetizers, and some cool surprises.

On Wednesday we received site tours of condos including The Top of the Village, Timberline, Crestwood, Stonebridge Inn, and the Snowmass Club Villas and were back on the slopes by 11am. We stopped at the Slider Cabin for some sandwiches and drinks before heading back to ski the rest of the day.

On Thursday we skied at our destination of choice. Some went to Aspen, while others went to Aspen Highland. Buttermilk was already closed for the season. I opted to stay at SNOWMASS. Did I mention it was my favorite?!

In the evening, we had a mix-and-mingle with other group leaders and ski suppliers while enjoying sliders, a mac & cheese bar and salad bar. Following dinner, we enjoyed a dessert reception sponsored by Ski.com where we met at least 30 reps from different US and international resorts. We discussed 2026 destinations and deals plus possible 2027 options.

We enjoyed great food while hearing all about skiing and riding in Italy! We finished up our Group Exchange appointments after lunch. 



Come join us at West Branch State Park for our 8th annual camping weekend. The campsites we reserved are in the shade; no tents baking in the sun! We hope to repeat the good food and great company from the last **7** years. We've reserved 5 campsites, and plan to make use of West Branch Reservoir and the hiking trails.

Location: West Branch State Park is east of Ravenna, at 5570 Esworthy Rd. It has camping, hiking trails, disk golf, fishing and a marina. One of the boat launches is close to the campground.

Bring your own camping gear, cooking gear, beverages and food. The **\$37 fee per person** will be paid for the campsites for Friday and Saturday nights. If more than the breakeven number of participants sign up, firewood and Friday night subs will be provided by the club—as funds allow.

There will be at least three kayaks to share; two singles and a tandem.

Campsites allow up to 3 tents, or 2 tents and a camper, and 2 cars per site. For more information contact activity@lewisskiclub.org. Reservations can be made on the <u>website</u>.
